DREDF PTI CENTER

DREDF runs a Parent Training & Information (PTI) Center serving Alameda, Contra Costa and Yolo counties. Funded in part by the U.S. Department of Education under the Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA), PTIs serve families of children with disabilities, from birth up to age 22. PTIs assist millions of families and supporting professionals each year through one-on-one assistance, trainings and workshops.

FOSTER YOUTH RESOURCES for EDUCATION

DREDF also runs a first-of-its-kind program, Foster Youth Resources for Education (FYRE), to ensure that foster youth with disabilities have comprehensive education supports in Alameda County. Although 40% of foster youth qualify for special education, they often lack effective educational advocacy and support.



Some reasons why we do what we do.

- Prior to IDEA, U.S. schools served only 1 in 5 children with disabilities.
- Only 56% of CA children enrolled in special education graduated with a diploma in 2005.
- Only 85% of the services specified in Individualized Education Plans are being provided.
- Children who have consistent, knowledgeable advocates are most likely to receive appropriate services and supports.

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


DREDF Mission & Vision Include Rights for Children

he DREDF PTI Center and Foster Youth Resources for Education (FYRE) are staffed by Education Advocates who are parents of children with disabilities. They assist families of the nearly 46,000 children in special education in the counties we serve.

In addition, DREDF Education Advocates serve families of children with disabilities who do not qualify for special education under IDEA, but who qualify for protections under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act. Education Advocates also train professionals who serve children. Services are provided at no cost.
